

6th Eurhistock Workshop – Call for papers

1-2 September 2016, Queen's University Belfast

As in Madrid (2009), Cambridge (2010), Paris (2011), Bonn (2012), Antwerp (2013), the 6th edition of the Eurhistock workshop aims at providing a meeting point for financial and economic historians as well as financial economists interested in the long-term changes of European financial markets. It provides a unique opportunity to discuss ongoing research and to revive or start up joint research initiatives.

Papers for presentation from all fields of finance are welcome as long as there is an historical perspective. We also invite both junior researchers and PhD students to attend. We are delighted that Lyndon Moore (The University of Melbourne) has agreed to give the keynote address.

Applications should be sent (in pdf format) **no later than 30 April 2016** by email to Christopher Coyle – c.coyle@qub.ac.uk.

The application should contain:

- paper title and abstract, not exceeding 300 words,
- contact information (name, affiliation, email) for all authors.

Submissions will be carefully examined by the organising committee and a notice of acceptance for presentation will be sent by the end of May 2016. Full papers should be forwarded by successful applicants by 30 June 2016. Presentations will be commented upon by participating discussants.
